The IUCN #NatureForAll movement inspires love, support, and action for nature. It is a living system of interconnected communities of change. It is based on the recognition that humans “are” nature, not separate from nature. Love is what connects us to nature and each other by involving our emotions. Love leads us to care and take positive action.

#NatureForAll is now a community of 640+ organizations from around the world, who have shared more than more than 1,000 stories, nature solutions and resources, like the [Sounds of Your Park](#) platform, the Discovery Zone and the #LoveNature ArcGIS StoryMap.

Spearheaded by the IUCN Commission on Education and Communication (CEC) and the IUCN World Commission on Protected Areas (WCPA), it has received invaluable support from numerous organisations since its launch in 2016, including from the [founding partners](#) Parks Canada, the Brandwein Institute, Canadian Museum of History, Canadian Parks Council, Canadian Wildlife Federation, PCI Media Impact and the New South Wales Office of Environment and Heritage. In particular, Parks Canada has also provided staff and funds to help coordinate the initiative ever since. More recently, the Alana Institute, the Children & Nature Network and Sustainable Forestry Initiative-Project Learning Tree have stepped in as core partners, providing financial and in-kind support over the last three years.

Summary

Through funding from core partners, #NatureForAll has been able to provide valuable in-person and online space for partners to share their stories and successes and find opportunities to collaborate and grow their work.

#NatureForAll, the CEC and the WCPA leveraged the yearly \$50,000 core funds into another \$650,000 in total project funds and in-kind support to promote and foster #NatureForAll efforts over the last three years.

Core funds were used primarily to promote the community online and at strategic conferences. Additional project funds were used to cover costs of key activities, in particular the Nature-based Education Pavilion at the IUCN Congress in 2025 and the CEC-led Education Day at CBD COP16 in Colombia in 2024. In-kind support was calculated by #NatureForAll partners who dedicated time and effort in promoting the movement within their regions and communities.

Looking Forward

Four important developments will shape #NatureForAll over the next four years.

- A new coordinating organisation is taking over from Parks Canada. CMS Vatavaran has been a #NatureForAll partner for many years, and its director, Dr. Vasanti Rao, is a CEC Steering Committee member. Based in India, [CMS VATAVARAN](#) will bring a new perspective while also ensuring the initiative adheres to its three core pillars: celebrate love and action for nature, foster enabling environments, and weave communities.
- During and leading up to the IUCN Congress, held from Oct. 9-16 in the United Arab Emirates, 17 #NatureForAll partners co-sponsored a [motion on strengthening human nature connectedness](#) (Motion 128), pledging more than \$500,000 in in-kind support to see the work done. This group has grown to over 40 interested people from #NatureForAll partners and various IUCN Commission working groups. Now that the motion was accepted, this work has the potential to provide many opportunities to strengthen the #NatureForAll community worldwide and to further engage partners on a shared goal. Plans are underway to engage with this group and create a Task Force/Working Group to explore ways to implement this resolution.
- A new collaboration with a college based in Canada (Algonquin College) and Esri (the global market leader in geographic information system (GIS) software, location intelligence, and mapping) has resulted in a new [GIS-based platform](#) where #NatureForAll partners and IUCN Commission members can share their stories of love of and action for nature. The #LoveNature Esri StoryMap is an innovative and user-friendly space that is already drawing interest from other groups including Reverse The Red and the Foundation for Environmental Education.
- The IUCN CEC announced at the Congress a [new global partnership with Esri](#) to expand access to data, maps, and GIS technology in support of nature-based education (NbE) worldwide. Esri is making a \$10 million in-kind donation to enable the development of a new NbE geoportal that will allow students, teachers, and IUCN conservationists around the world to understand and explore our planet through maps and the science of geography, collaborate on critical conservation solutions, and develop critical technical skills for future careers in conservation. This new initiative, now in the pilot phase of consultation and design, will support IUCN's NbE aspirations to promote environmental learning and action as adopted by the Members during the IUCN World Conservation Congress in Abu Dhabi in 2025.

IUCN World Conservation Congress

Because #NatureForAll is an IUCN initiative, the World Conservation Congress represents an important milestone for the movement. It is an opportunity to showcase partner successes and efforts, celebrate achievements, reflect on past efforts and plan for the future.

Core partner funding was used to send the #NatureForAll coordinator to the 2025 event held in Abu Dhabi to support two in-person meetings, to host a celebration event at the Canada Pavilion and to coordinate sessions at the Nature-based Education Pavilion, the Youth Pavilion and the Africa Pavilion. The coordinator also engaged with congress attendees on the human-nature connectedness motion as well as to promote the Sounds of Your Park initiative, recruiting more young professionals into a capacity building initiative related to sound recording in protected areas.

This year's Congress also saw the election of a new CEC Chair, Dr. Margaret Otieno of Kenya, following the completion of 9 years of leadership by outgoing Chair, Sean Southey, now CEO of

the Canadian Wildlife Federation. It was also an opportunity to announce CMS VATAVARAN as the new coordinating organisation for #NatureForAll, following Parks Canada's nearly ten years of service. Parks Canada was celebrated and honored at the Congress for their outstanding contributions to the #NatureForAll movement.

As part of taking stock, it was also an opportunity to review the [original motion](#) that launched #NatureForAll in 2016, and propose a [new motion](#) aimed at strengthening human-nature connectedness.

With these milestones in mind, #NatureForAll was featured in the following ways at the Congress:

- #NatureForAll sponsored fishbowl sessions at three different pavilions, featuring different speakers, to gather information and promote the motion.
- Various sessions at the Nature-based Education pavilion provided an opportunity for #NatureForAll partners to showcase their work, strengthen relationships and seek new opportunities.
- A meeting with co-sponsors of the motion and other interested parties was held to discuss potential next steps.
- A meeting with key #NatureForAll partners focused on discussion of the future of the movement.
- Two evening celebratory events, one at the Canada Pavilion marking Parks Canada's commitment to the initiative over the last nine years and another at the Nature-based Education Pavilion, celebrated individuals' and organisations' achievements in connecting people with nature.
- A 2-hour storytelling workshop, as part of the Forum organised by CEC Steering Committee members, featured Esri and a WCPA young professional.

- A Nature For All sensory Forum session was organised and presented by Families In Nature.
- A student art contest was organised by three #NatureForAll partners.
- Two presentations related to the Sounds of Your Park initiative, including one by three young professionals, showcased the recorder exchange program in action.
- The new #LoveNature Esri StoryMap initiative was displayed.
- Three new IUCN publications co-branded with #NatureForAll were presented at IUCN's Hot Off the Press sessions: Creating Effective Environmental Communications Strategies, A Guide to Nature-based Leadership, and Ten Steps to Greening School Grounds and Nature-based Education.
- Workshop sessions were held on various #NatureForAll-related efforts, including, and not limited to, nature-based education, story-telling, communications strategies, and nature-based leadership.
- In addition, the Chair of the CEC, Sean Southey, highlighted the work of #NatureForAll, and the core partners, during his report presentation to the IUCN Members' Assembly.

Testimonials/Case Studies

Jesse Hildebrand, Exploring By The Seat of Your Pants, Canada

Through direct action by #NatureForAll in connecting me with partners, EBTSOYP has received well over \$100,000 in grants allowing us to run over 300 programs reaching tens of thousands of students. Most notably collaborations with Reverse The Red and the Canadian Wildlife Federation. We also ran a wildly successful #NatureForAll nature art campaign, twice in fact, reaching over 3,000 kids from 15 countries on 5 continents. I literally know of no greater connection organization in the world!

Wildroots India

Drawing inspiration from IUCN'S global initiative #NatureForAll and seed funding from the IUCN Commission on Education and Communication, Wildroots India has implemented six cohorts of a [Youth Climate & Conservation Fellowship Programme](#). The initiative provides students with immersive conservation educational modules and nature-based learning experiences. What started with just 10 students has now grown to a yearly effort inspiring a deeper connection with nature and fostering a sense of environmental stewardship among the youth. The programme has reached more than 2,600 students who have designed follow-up projects and action plans that have helped weave a community of students and educators across Indian schools.

#NatureForAll Awards, Green Film Network (GFN)

The Green Film Network, a global association of 32 environmental film festivals, collaborated with the IUCN Commission on Education and Communication to rebrand its annual award for Best Short Green Film and Best Feature Green Film as [#NatureForAll Awards](#). The awards highlight the best of all selected films of the previous GFN cycle, with each GFN member festival eligible to propose nominees of their own annual selection.

CEC and WCPA Dialogues

Between February 2023 and March 2024, the WCPA and CEC hosted nine [#NatureForAll dialogues](#). These webinars focused on themes and priorities that align with #NatureForAll's core knowledge foundation: the more people connect with and learn about nature, the more they will take action to protect it. The aim of the dialogues was to explore conservation, biodiversity and climate change themes in the context of #NatureForAll's mission to inspire love, support, and action for nature.

Toolkits

Two new toolkits were added to a growing list of tools and resources to help partners incorporate #NatureForAll into their activities. The Youth Oasis toolkit is a 10-step guide to help organisations co-create and incorporate a youth focused space at their conference. The Celebrating Love of Nature toolkit is a guide designed to help partners create and organise an event or activity that celebrates love of and action for nature.
